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Literacy

At Taieri College, we are all about lighting up your literacy. One of the ways in which our writing can shine is by crisping up the way in which we use commas.

Using commas correctly can make a huge difference to the meaning of a sentence, can't it? Check out this classic example of someone who should have printed off their own Comma Rules booklet:
