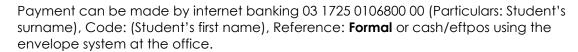

## Level 2 Biology and Geography Aoraki Mt Cook Trip

Last term, 50 students and 5 staff embarked on our annual trip to Aoraki Mt Cook. The focus for the trip was to learn about the biophysical environment of the Aoraki Mt Cook National Park and how various tourist related activities impact on it. The students also learnt about the different ways the Department of Conservation are making those impacts more sustainable.

On the way up we stopped at Loch Laird for lunch which is just below the Benmore Dam. Then it was up to the Mt Cook village where presenters from DoC talked about



how the village operates in terms of accommodation, sewage, water supply and rubbish management. After this, it was back to the Glentanner Lodge where we were staying for the trip some 20km back down the road. Due to covid restrictions, we had the lodge to ourselves. Students cooked for themselves and it was great to see the quality of home cooked food by each group.

Thursday was our big day. We left Glentanner at 7:30pm and dropped a couple of groups off for their Tasman Glacier plane trip at the Mt Cook airport. This usually involves a glacier landing but due to a lack of snow and warm, dry conditions, the plane was unable to land. Instead, the plane trip involved an extra long trip up the Tasman Glacier to the saddle, across to the Fox and Franz Joseph neve and then back across the eastern face of Mt Cook. Truly an awesome trip! A small group opted for the Glacier Explorer boat trip instead of the plane trip. This involved an hour long jet boat trip on the Tasman Glacier lake where students learnt about the glacier's formation, movement and earth-shaping nature in situ. The trip also took students underneath the large moraine walls, idled next to icebergs and took them as close to the tongue of the glacier as possible.

In between students going off at regular intervals for their flight or boat trip, students completed a precis sketch of the glaciated landscape features, measured the impact of track widening and desire lines by hikers and sampled the vegetation in the lower Hooker Valley. Students also learnt about the many unique adaptations of these species given the harsh physical environment they live in. At the end of the day, and after some exploring of The Hermitage and surrounding village, students took part in a DoC talk about the challenges faced in the National Park in the next ten years and some creative strategies DoC are considering implementing to make these impacts sustainable on the people, plants and animals that live in the park.

After our last night at Glentanner, we finished our trip on the Friday by walking up the Hooker Valley to the Hooker lake. This is an awesome valley with great views. We did some vegetation sampling in the upper valley in order to see the how the composition of plants changes compared to the lower valley. Morning tea was on the lakefront where some students had a quick dip in the lake – a cool 0.7°C. Once back at the car park it was a long trip home.

A big thank you to the staff who organised and went on this trip, and to the students who were a great bunch to take away.





## Year 7 & 8 Water Polo Term 1

In Term One we had two Water Polo teams. One in Year 7 and one in Year 8. The Year 8s played in the A grade and finished third overall. This was a great result for the Barracudas who had their first term ever in the A grade. They are looking to build on this result in Term Four.

The Year 7 Taniwhas have made huge progress and improvement. Playing in the B grade, which has the largest number of teams and the widest range of abilities. However, a result against one school team sums up the season. We lost to them 11-0 at the start of the season and beat them 4-3 by the end of the season.

We are very thankful to our hard working team of coaches, Brad Gilmour, Laura Gale and Keira Hughes, who trained us every Tuesday after school. They are very passionate and enthusiastic about water polo and this is reflected in our teams' development. Mrs Hughes continues to manage both our teams on our Friday night game nights. If you're interested in water polo, we will be playing again in Term Four, listen out for sign ups towards the end of Term Three.

Shane's talk provided some inspiring messages which I believe related well to our own school. One of them was the way we approach our sporting games. For Shane it was important to reverse his team's mindset to where they knew it was going to be a hard game, but they were ready to take on that challenge. Another message was about leadership. ## Literacy and Numeracy Pilots - Year 10 2022

This year the English and Maths departments, along with Year 10, will be supporting the Ministry of Education and NZQA to pilot the new literacy and numeracy standards.

The new literacy and numeracy standards will help ensure that students have the foundational skills to support them in further studies, work, and life. The standards will become a mandatory part of NCEA in 2023.

This pilot is part of changes that are happening to strengthen NCEA.

Changes include: having more learning and fewer assessments, weaving mātauranga Māori through learning, and creating clearer pathways to education and employment.

Year 10 will be sitting:

- A reading standard
- A writing standard
- A numeracy standard

What do you as whānau need to know about being a pilot school whānau?

- Whānau are not expected to pay any extra costs.
- The assessment for the majority of Year 10 will take place at the end of Term 2 and again in Term 3.
- The assessment will be a Common Assessment Activity. This is a test that students will sit in the classroom.
- Credits achieved in the pilot will be counted towards your child's NCEA results in 2023.
- They will also have the opportunity to sit the assessment in 2023.

What can I do to support my child?

- It is helpful to encourage your child to read and write at home or in their day-to-day activities. We will support them to achieve this by gathering materials that are meaningful to them.
- You can also find ways to support numeracy in the home, such as using measurement in recipes.
- Encourage your child to ask for support when they need it.
- More ideas for literacy are part of the weekly Taieri College newsletter.

More information about this assessment will be provided to you closer to the time. The teaching of Literacy and Numeracy remains something that is covered across the curriculum but for this year, the English and Maths teachers are taking a close interest in the teaching of the skills and the preparation to ensure that this is a positive experience for all our students. Please talk to your student's teacher if you have any questions.

## Launch Of Pop-Up Youth Space with Art, Music, Dance & Kai

Artworks, creative workshops, gigs, wellbeing clinics and a warm welcome will greet rangatahi as they enter a pop-up central city youth space. Organisers are putting the finishing touches to a packed programme over the two week initiative called Ōtepoti Youth Space which coincides with the national Youth Week.

A launch event will take place on Sunday 8 May 2022 from 2.00pm and will feature an exhibition of youth art, live music, dance and kai. Special guest, Jane Zintl, CEO of Youth Week/Ara Taiohi will speak at the opening. Timed to coincide with the national Youth Week, the pop-up youth space aims to celebrate the talent of young people while providing information about opportunities and support available.

Located on Princes Street at the Community Gallery and neighbouring performance space Te Whare o Rukutia, the Ōtepoti Youth Space will have a focus on creativity and community connections. A welcoming hangout space, open each day from 3pm-6:30pm, will feature a range of activities each afternoon with youth mentors on hand to korero with and support youth as needed.

Free workshops each afternoon, presented by youth organisations, range from stencil art, slam poetry, zine making, hip hop and drumming. Friday and Saturday nights are open late until 9pm and feature an open mic night and youth bands. "This a great opportunity for rangatahi to express themselves and for us all to celebrate the role young people play in the community in a positive and supportive way," said Ōtepoti Youth Space coordinator, Jo Taylor.

"Young people have been telling us they want more youth friendly spaces so we would love to see young people make the most of this opportunity. Now's the time to get involved."

The initiative is being facilitated by a collective of creative and youth organisations and has been supported by the Otago Community Trust, the Creative Communities Scheme and Dunedin Casino Charitable Trust.

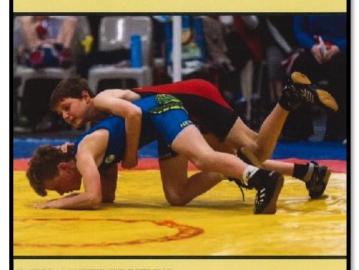
