
School Magazine 2023 \$25.00

While subject choice at this stage of the year is not binding, the number of classes, and staff allocation, are based on this return, and therefore this should be filled in as accurately as possible.


A booklet provided to all students contains information on all subjects available. Note that, in general, subjects only operate where there are sufficient students choosing that subject.

Level 3 Biology trip to Orokonui

In Week 9 of Term 3, the Level 3 Biology students ventured to Orokonui Ecosanctuary to carry out field work for their chosen investigation. Students were looking at how an environmental gradient such as light, exposure or altitude affected leaf morphology in their chosen native species. Taylor Collier-Davies, who is the senior educational leader at Orokonui, had visited Taieri College the previous week to help students plan their investigation. He met the students on the day and gave them an initial introduction and welcome. After that, the students were off with light meters, anemometers, micrometres, and plenty of sampling bags among their gear to collect and measure their leaves. The morning was calm and sunny, making it quite pleasant, but that turned around lunchtime to heavy showers which caught out those who had ventured down the Bellbird Track to sample leaves at different altitudes. One highlight of the day was our head boy Andrew Matheson having a South Island Kaka land on his head. Overall, the day was a success, and lots of work was achieved. A big thank you to Taylor as well as Mr Hackfath and Ms Miller who helped run the trip.















Secondary Schools National Ngā Manu Kōrero

The Secondary Schools National Ngā Manu Kōre<mark>ro (Speech Competition) was held in Ōtepoti this week on Tuesday 19 September, Wednesday 20 September Thursday 21 September.</mark>

All of the Dunedin Secondary Schools have been practising the haka and waiata for the powhiri to welcome in the Manuhiri (visitors) of 50 Secondary Schools from around NZ.


Ngā Manu Kōrero is regarded as the most significant event on the Māori education calendar for nurturing the oratory skills and providing the stage for young people to express their views and to lay down their challenges to an admiring and critical audience of peers, parents, whānau, and judges.

The speech contests are intended to encourage the development of skills and confidence of Māori students in spoken English and te reo Māori. All secondary schools are invited to participate in this wonderful event, noting that the Māori section is open to all students as part of a strategy to support everyone to learn and to speak in te reo Māori.

The competitions are in four divisions: the Pei Te Hurinui Jones Contest (Senior Māori), Korimako Contest (Senior English, Te Rāwhiti Ihaka Contest (Junior Māori) and Sir Turi Carroll Contest (Junior English).









Level 3 Tourism / Geography Te Anau trip


Then it was off home, and we set sail – literally, as for once we had a tail wind. Thanks to all the companies involved, as you made it a trip the students will never forget.
