
Touch

Caregiving: your aroha and patience can make a big difference

There are tamariki and rangatahi in your community in need of care

We know it's best when tamariki and rangatahi can stay at home safely. When this isn't possible, we take a whānau/family first approach to caring for tamariki and rangatahi. We work with parents and the wider whānau to explore who can offer a safe, stable and loving home when it's needed.

It's also important we have approved caregivers who can provide care for tamariki and rangatahi when they are not able to stay with whānau straight away. These caregivers provide care for tamariki while we work with the parents and whānau to safely return tamariki and rangatahi home or to live with their wider whānau.

How can you help?

There are different ways you can care for tamariki and rangatahi. In your region we're currently looking for caregivers who can provide emergency, respite, short-term care or supporting independence.

Emergency care is when tamariki and rangatahi are placed in your care at very short notice because there are immediate concerns for their safety, and there is nowhere else safe for them to go right now. This type of care is for a short time while other arrangements are made, It can often occur at night or during the weekend.

Respite care is when you look after tamariki or rangatahi for a weekend or short period of time. Respite care is best when it is planned and regular. It provides an opportunity for tamariki and rangatahi to connect with wider members of their whānau or community, and for caregivers and tamariki to recharge.

Short-term care is when you look after tamariki or rangatahi while we're working with their whānau to safely return them to their parent's care or, if this is not possible, to the care of another safe family, whānau, hapū or iwi member. Supporting tamariki and rangatahi to return home, or transition to another care arrangement or to independence, is an important part of the role of a short-term caregiver. Supporting Independence is when you care for rangatahi aged 18-21, enabling a gradual transition for them as they leave care, helping them get a good start to their adult lives and transition to independence

This type of caregiving involves assisting rangatahi in the development of skills and knowledge over time, and supporting them to grow and learn.

About You

Caregivers from all walks of life open their hearts and homes to tamariki and rangatahi. They have a diverse range of backgrounds, cultures and experiences, just like the tamariki and rangatahi they care for.

Every caregiver is unique. They're connected through their willingness to help, and the aroha they have for the tamariki and rangatahi in their care.

Tamariki and rangatahi have told us they need caregivers who make them feel loved and part of the whānau, and help them learn, heal and grow.

The tamariki and rangatahi that can't live at home come from a range of circumstances and have their own experiences. Many have been harmed by the adults they trusted and may have had a difficult start to life.

Their past experiences will have affected them, so being able to stick with them if things get tough is really important. This means being patient, understanding the effects of trauma, and being willing to learn more about how you can best support them.

The rewards of being a caregiver are great if you have aroha, patience and an open mind.
