Taieri College Student Council Workday Years 9 -13, 5 May 2023

In the past, Taieri College Student Council have undertaken a student workday each year involving Year 9-13 students. This unfortunately has not been able to take place more than once in the past few years due to COVID. The funds raised from this are given back directly to the students for their benefit. The metal picnic tables, the outdoor basketball hoops, extra drinking fountains, funding eft-pos and paywave services at the canteen, subsidising cultural and sporting individuals and groups representing the college are all examples of ways these funds have been used in the past.

This year the Student Council are planning to hold the Year 9-13 Workday on the same day as the scheduled Teacher Only Day in Week 2 of Term 2: Friday 5 May 2023. Our target/goal is to raise \$12,000.

Students are asked to find a job at home or in the community and to return any payment received for this to the office. We would hope that each student would be able to contribute a minimum of \$20.00. On many occasions in the past students have been able to help neighbours and whānau with small jobs on this day while also giving back to the school community.

This is a great way for our school community to help each other and our wider community, while also developing our young adults' understanding of what it is like to be employed. A good work ethic on this day can result in part-time employment for our students on a more regular basis.

Level 3 Biology Trip to the Otago Peninsula







On Tuesday this week, 21 students and 2 staff went on our annual trip down the Otago Peninsula to learn about the impacts of tourism on the peninsula's ecosystem. The day started at school with a session learning about the history of Taiaroa Head and actions taken by staff at the Albatross Centre to help conserve the Northern Royal Albatross. We then headed out in vans over the high peninsula road to the Albatross Centre where we learnt more about the actions taken to conserve the albatross and other species that inhabit Taiaroa Head. It was then off to the viewing hide to see Albatross juveniles and adults trying to land in the strong southerly wind on the headland to feed their chicks or 'show off' to potential mates.

After a short lunch at the café, we headed to Weller's Rock where we boarded the Monarch for a one hour trip around Taiaroa Head and out to the open ocean waters. On this trip we saw seals, lots of species of albatross, Little Blue Penguins and Giant Petrels, but the highlight was having a pod of Hector's Dolphins swim in front of the boat and jump out of the water. This was the first trip we had ever seen the dolphins.

Once we were back on shore, it was off to Pilot's Beach to learn about how tourists had degraded the beach over the last 30 years and all the actions taken by Department of Conservation, the local hapu, and other rangers to restore the habitat and support the Little Blue Penguins.

The last trip of the day was to Penguin Place where we learnt about the biology and threats to Yellow-eyed Penguins. Next, we visited the recovery centre where some 90 malnourished, Yellow-eyed Penguins and one Fiordland Crested Penguin were being fed and cared for. The day ended with a van trip out to Pipikaretu Beach to walk through the reserve and its elaborate array of viewing trenches. Unfortunately, we were not able to view a Yellow-eyed Penguin here, but that is often the nature of the trip given how rare they are becoming.

Prefect Reading 23 March 2023

Kia ora everyone, and welcome to this assembly. As your Culture Prefect, I'm here to talk to you today about a concept that's deeply rooted in Māori culture: manaakitanga. Manaakitanga is often translated as "hospitality" or "caring for others," but it's much more than that. It's a way of being, a way of living that reflects the interconnectedness of all things.

Manaakitanga is about showing respect and kindness to everyone around you, regardless of their background or culture. It's about sharing your resources, your time, and your energy to uplift and support those in need. It's about recognizing the inherent value and dignity of every human being, and treating them with the love and care they deserve.

Now, I know that being a teenager can be tough. We're all trying to figure out who we are and where we fit in, and sometimes that can lead to cliques and exclusion. But I want to challenge you all to embrace the value of manaakitanga and make an effort to include and uplift those around you. Whether it's checking in on a friend who's struggling, inviting someone new to sit with you at lunch, or simply smiling and saying hello to someone in the hallway. Every small act of kindness can make a big difference. At its core, manaakitanga is about building relationships and connections. It's about recognizing that we're all part of a larger community, and that our actions can have a ripple effect on those around us. When we show kindness and respect to others, we not only make their lives

better, we also create a more positive and harmonious environment for ourselves.

As we strive to be better members of our school community, I want to leave you with a quote from Te Puea Hērangi, a prominent Māori leader and activist. "Ehara taku toa i te toa takitahi, engari he toa takitini." This translates to "My strength is not that of an individual, but that of the collective." When we embrace the value of manaakitanga and build each other up, we create a collective strength that's greater than any individual could achieve on their own. So let's choose to be kind, choose to be inclusive, and choose to live out the value of manaakitanga in everything we do. Thank you for your time today, and I look forward to seeing all the ways you'll put this value into action.




